MILITARY SPOUSE COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP INITIATIVE AFTER ACTION REPORT







PROGRAM BACKGROUND

In the summer of 2023 ADC launched the Military Spouse Community Leadership Initiative. Designed to integrate military spouses and their perspectives into local installation-community relations, ADC (in partnership with senior military spouses) selected the first cohort of nine spouses from across the country representing the Army, Air/Space Force and Marine Corps to take part in the program. These spouses joined their respective community and installation representatives at the 2023 Installation Innovation Forum (IIF) where they shared their insights on quality-of-life challenges, learned about installationcommunity partnerships, installation management and local economic development efforts.

Building on the success of inviting military spouses to IIF, ADC continued this partnership bringing the first cohort of spouses to attend the 2024 Defense Communities National Summit, an annual event held in Washington, DC that focuses on the key issues that are driving defense policy in DOD and Congress. Over three days, the first cohort of spouses were able to meet and network with decisionmakers on Capitol Hill and at the Pentagon, learning firsthand how community leaders can impact defense policy and advocate for their communities and installations. This year's initiative was made possible by the sponsor, the Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES).

ENGAGEMENT AT THE DEFENSE COMMUNITIES NATIONAL SUMMIT

While attending the National Summit, military spouses were able to share their knowledge, learn best practices about on-the-ground military-community partnerships and network with a wide variety of stakeholders. During the event, spouses had a combination of scheduled activities and time to "choose their own adventure," attending whichever breakout sessions appealed to them most.

Caucus Policy Breakfast on Capitol Hill

Spouses traveled to Capitol Hill to attend ADC's Caucus Policy Breakfast. There, they had the opportunity to connect with Congressional staffers, that represented over 100 congressional offices. Spouses were able to observe how defense community leaders engage with policy makers and advocate for their communities and installations.

Pentagon Visit

With the help of former Chief of Army Partnerships, Ivan Bolden (Ivan Bolden and Associates LLC), spouses visited the Pentagon to meet with key leaders, and visit with the Chief of Staff of the Army, Gen. Randy George. Spouses had the opportunity to sit down with the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Military Community and Family Policy, Patty Barron, and Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower and Reserve Affairs, Ron Keohane. The group had a productive conversation exchanging insights and sharing perspectives.



National Summit Participation

ADC wanted to ensure spouses felt included, welcomed, and championed throughout the event. The spouses were able to meet with the Air Force and Army Exchange Service representatives, the initiative's sponsor, to discuss their thoughts and opinions on quality-of-life challenges as part of a military family. The Exchange has programs specifically for military spouses and families and the spouses feedback proved invaluable as they discussed area's of improvement with key leaders. Ivan Bolden played a crucial role in helping advocate for the spouse's seat at the table, as he set up meetings with key leaders and held daily after action meetings to hear their feedback.

Outcomes

- **Higher Level Engagement** Spouses were able to speak with leaders from the Pentagon that hold positions that can directly affect military families and policy, and were given the opportunity to meet with them and share concerns.
- Stronger Connections to Local Leaders Spouses were able to connect with local community members and congressional aides from their area.
- **Expanding Networks** Spouses were able to use this experience to expand their network and further conversations that were initiated during the last conference, IIF.

Next Steps

The military spouse cohort at the 2024 National Summit was ADC's second Military Spouse Community Leadership Initiative activation. Overall, the initiative was a great success and there was strong support from all stakeholders for continuing this effort in the future.

- Provide spouses the opportunity to be recognized at the beginning of the next conference by having them introduce themselves on stage or create a video to play at a general session.
- Increase attendee engagement with the spouses by providing them the opportunity to host a panel, where they can share insights and answer questions.
- Create a pin or broach that spouses can wear throughout the conference that better identify their role, to help initiate conversation.
- Develop and conduct outreach to the next cohort of spouses:
 - Identify the next group of military spouses to participate in ADC's two annual events, the Installation Innovation Forum and the Defense Communities National Summit.
 - Allow and encourage previous cohort to return to ADC events and act as mentors to the new spouses.
 - Work to diversity the cohort culturally, and encourage participation from a male spouse.
- Create smaller round table opportunities for spouses, so they are able to have more intimate conversations with leaders and attendees.
- Hold monthly meetings for this military spouse group to keep spouses engaged with each other and to share ideas and resources.
- Expand the program by developing DOD support opportunities
- Develop working papers/proposals as follow-ons from each conference.
